However, ‘happy’ is an understatement since, in common with most grandparents, spending precious time with our grandchildren is a delight, even when the anguished cry goes up from four-year-old Oscar in the bathroom that cleaning up operations are required.

On this occasion, nana drew the short straw, hence the toilet question. My first reaction was to burst out laughing, but Oscar, pants round his ankles, was waiting for an answer.

“Well, I suppose, people whose job it is to make toilets.” This sounded lame, even to me. Oscar thought so too.

“God made our toilet,” he pronounced, with the air of one who would brook no further discussion.

I launched into another inadequate response. “Yes, God made everything, so He made all the materials we need to make toilets and....”

Engaged in the hand washing operation, which leaves anyone in the vicinity a little damp round the edges, Oscar continued to set me right. “God made my mummy and my daddy and...”



Food for thought by Rev David Houghton

Service à la.....?

It's so easy to get in a muddle when eating in a new country. And it could be an embarrassing or even expensive muddle.

I have yet to visit Japan and so manage to have avoided the potential hazards of negotiating a tea ritual. But I have been caught out in a Paris restaurant where an invitation to take a 'petit digestif' has resulted in a mortgage size addition to the 'addition'.

I am currently Locum Chaplain in Porto, the rightly named 'working' city of northern Portugal. The food here, especially fish straight from the Atlantic, can be succulent and delicious.

The Duoro wine, relatively little known outside the country is also excellent. And there is a local variation on how to order from a restaurant menu – and how the order is then served. So please note the two prices on a menu – one for 1 portion and the other for ½ portion.


Now, I may be naïve, but I first assumed the ½ portion would be designed for children, those who have already had dinner, or the thrifty/mean. So it seemed quite right for the two of us to order two full portions: one of steak and the other of pork. The waiter was puzzled. 'This is too much'. No, a full portion is for two people, maybe for three people! Indeed, he insisted, the ½ portion of pork (well presented with nice accompaniments), is really enough for two people. So a ½ portion for ourselves is really sufficient? He nods approvingly.

I have learnt something new in northern Portugal. Be very careful with your expectations. When the food arrives it is invariably presented on a serving dish from which one takes helpings as seems right. This fits in well with a fairly loose definition of 'portion' and just means that the customer has the choice of how much actually to serve for himself or herself – for this ritual is played out even when dining alone. And even in the most humble and ordinary of restaurants. I was (sort of) told off last night at my 'local' for setting knife and fork straight into the serving plate.

But of course, is this not also a reminder of the celebrated distinction between 'service à la française' and 'service à la russe?' The traditional 'service à la française', is where food arrives from the kitchen in no particular order, and the guest/customer helps themselves according to taste and desire. All very sensible. But a Russian ambassador in Paris at the time of the First Empire, fed up with cold

food and disregard for the distinguishing feature of each dish, introduced the novelty of serving food in set courses. This is much as we expect now, when eating in almost any kind of 'eating establishment'. Though it doesn't really work for the food of Asia. And what about the 'Buffet'?

But that's another tale....



Ponte Dom Luis I - Porto






